Check out our new Website and update your Profile

The APC website is now operating under the Journal of Prosthetic dentistry super-website. This means that you can update your profile (addresses, phone numbers) at any time in the future. The APC membership plans to use the website for more communication and archiving past meeting minutes. We will also offer a downloadable version of Frontline available from the website for those who do not wish to receive a paper copy.

In order to access the members only section of the new APC website you will require a login and password as per the enclosed letter. The web address is www.prosthodontics.ca and the members only section is accessed through the Members Home Page link in the left navigation menu.

After logging in, please take a few moments to check and update your member profile. Click on the "My Profile" link in the left menu. On the My Profile pages you can click on links to add to or edit your contact information, update your professional information, and even upload a photo of yourself if you like. You may add several addresses, and each address may have several phone numbers associated with it. Similarly, you may add several email or website addresses.

Please note that all your contact information automatically has a privacy setting of "members only". This means that only members who have properly logged into the members section of the site may view

your addresses, telephone numbers, email addresses and personal website addresses. The other privacy settings available are "public" and "administrators only."

You can control who can view your information for each individual address (or other piece of contact information) separately by changing the privacy settings appropriately. We have set up various methods for you to control who has access to your information. For instance, you may not want your home address available to the public but do wish the public to find your dental practice address on the "Find a Dentist" page of the website. In that case, your home address privacy setting should be "members only" or "administrators only", while your practice address is set to "public."

If an address or other information is set to "administrators only" only the executive or website administrator of your organization will have access to the information. Other members and the public will not be able to access that address online.

Also note that in order for your practice contact information to show up on a public "Find a Dentist" search results page, you must also set the "address type" to "practice". Other "address type" settings include: home, office, mailing, school, other and institution. These address types will not appear in a "Find a Dentist" search by default.

DR. PAUL SILLS • 1926 - 2005



The Association of Prosthodontists of Canada wishes to advise its members of the passing of our dear colleague and mentor to manyDr. Paul Sills. Paul passed away suddenly on Thursday, August 18, 2005 at University Hospital, London, Ontario, surrounded by family. A celebration of life was held at Siloam United Church in London on Monday, August 22, 05.

Dr. Sills started his dental career as a graduate from The University of Toronto after which he joined the Canadian Armed Forces. During his time in the Armed Forces, Dr. Sills pursued graduate training in prosthodontics from Walter Reed Dental Corps in Washington D.C. He became a Diplomat of the American Board of Prosthodontics and on his return to Canada was one of the earliest Fellows of the Royal College in the field of Prosthodontics. A few years later Dr. Sills resigned from the Armed Forces and took up a full time faculty position at the University of Western Ontario – Dental School, a position he held until his retirement. He continued to be affiliated with the University as Professor Emeritus having a very active role until his demise.

Dr. Sills enjoyed a long and prosperous career during which he touched the lives of many patients, students, staff and dentists. He will be best remembered for his jovial personality that put everyone at ease who worked alongside him. He was always willing to give time to his students making learning fun and enjoyable. The numerous teaching awards best reflect this, most notably the 3M Canada Teaching Award. For the University of Western Ontario and for the academic world of dentistry his loss leaves a large vacuum. His colleagues and especially junior faculty members took him as their role model. He had a unique capability of identifying the strong characteristics in people and then nurturing and encouraging the individual to bring their best out.

His contributions to the field of prosthodontics are significant. Numerous prosthodontists and dentists held him as their mentor. His advice and guidance helped direct the careers of many dentists, aspiring and practicing prosthodontists.

He will be dearly missed. He leaves behind his partner Joyce and their children and grandchildren.

DR. JEAN NADEAU • 1917 - 2005

This will be of particular interest to all those who studied at University of Montreal. The day before Paul Sills passed away; there was another who also passed away. It was Dr. Jean Nadeau, a famous prosthodontist who spent 38 years of his life teaching at U of M.

Jean, who was 88, was married to Dr. Claude Béique who also spent her entire career at U of M. Jean Nadeau served in the RCDC for four years during the war and then was loaned to the university and stayed there. He was a pioneer in Maxillofacial Prosthodontics and renowned in all of North America. He was a member of countless associations in Canada and the US.

After retiring, he turned his attention to the study of languages: Spanish and more recently Chinese. He was also an amateur-radio enthusiast, something he practiced all his life.

Back in the mid eighties I was chatting with Paul Sills (he was talking, I was listening) during a CDA Convention in Montreal and Paul said something like this: "you have here in Montreal one of the best, if not the best, prosthodontist in North America". That is Jean Nadeau. I had the privilege to work as a clinician for two years, in his department, at U of M. The little that I knew then, I owed it to my time at the school with Paul Sills.

Two giants have fallen but they will be remembered by everyone that came across their path.

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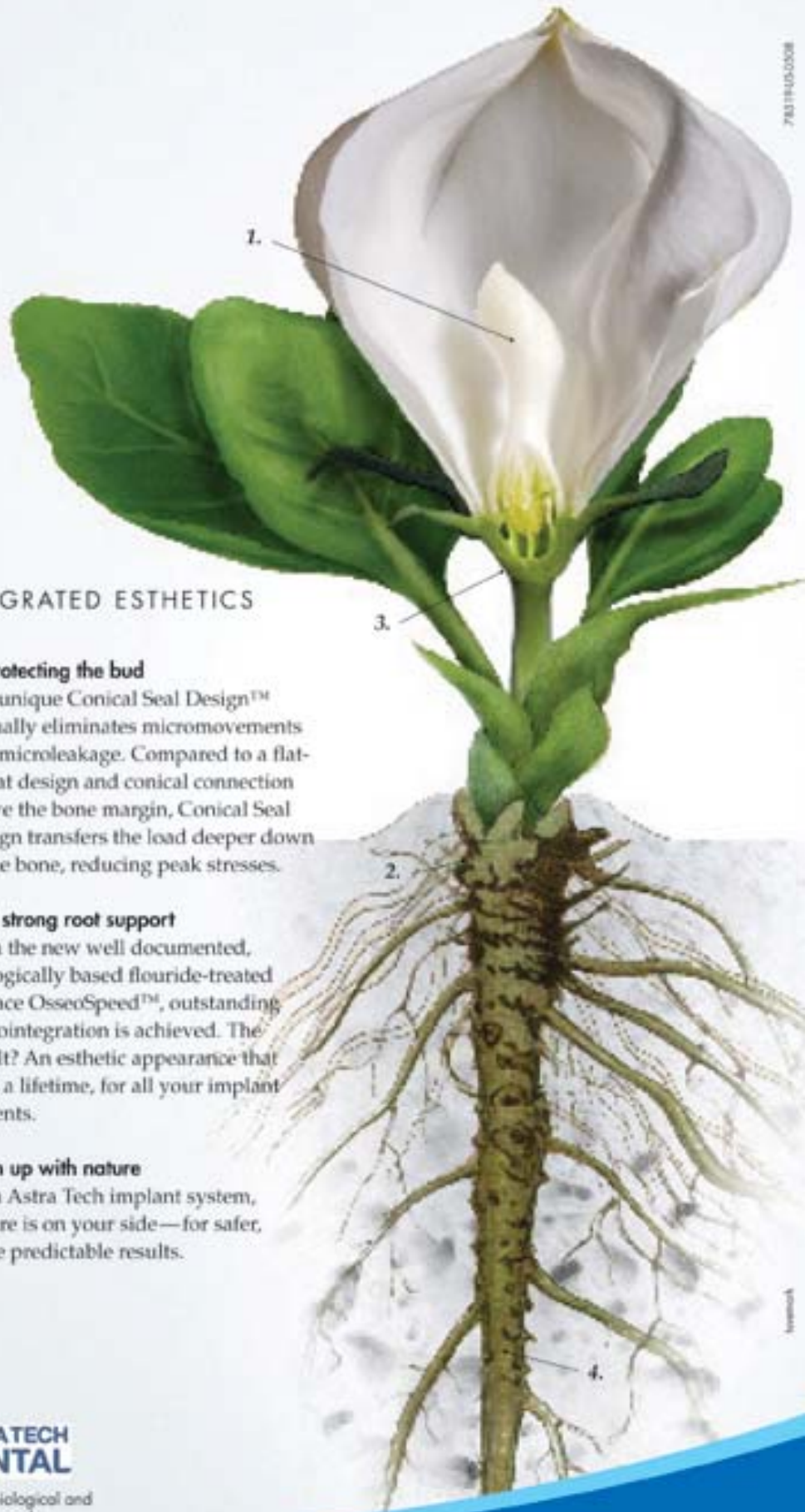
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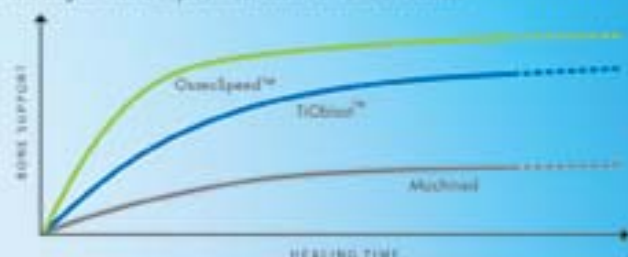
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
